As with your RQAB, I think that your good research and understanding of this topic shows in your clear and concise prospectus. What struck me as I was reading this is that your topic is innovative because you are less concerned with climate change itself, and more concerned with debates about how to combat it - on a global level, or at a local level - and this is, I believe, a nice way to investigate a really big topic. So, I commend you on focusing on this larger topic of climate change in this way.

Therefore, moving forward, I would encourage you to give more historical context about this debate itself - how long has this debate between people who argue for global solutions vs. those who argue for local solutions been going on? Why does this debate matter? What is at stake in the debate? What I am getting at with these questions is essentially saying, 'okay, so let's say that those who believe in a global solution are more successful in convincing others around the globe that their solution is better - why does this matter? why would this be a problem?' Also, among those who advocate for the idea that each place needs its own local solution - what are the different kinds of solutions proposed? And what does 'local' mean in this context - each country? each continent? each region?

Lastly, while the sources you've found are good - you should be continually performing research - the fact that these are the same exact sources as the RQAB doesn't show that you've continued to develop your research.

Overall, you've done good work - but please don't stop researching and formulating your ideas! Please consider some of my questions above as you continue to turn this prospectus into your final paper!
