

Term Paper Guidelines

Due: Wednesday of Finals Week

50 Points

The main purpose for this activity is to *thoroughly* research an issue beyond what was covered in class or text. You may choose any relevant topic of interest to you but the topic must consider an ***International Perspective or aspect.***

I expect the paper ***to be at least 1500 words*** (approximately 5 pages). You need to use ***at least five scholarly peer reviewed sources*** for the paper but more is definitely better. The sources must be properly cited within the text to give credit to the source authors. Be sure you use the proper ***APA format*** for referencing your sources, examples are provided below.

You must use ***SCHOLARY SOURCES*** such as journal articles, books, or government reports. You may ***NOT*** use your textbook as a referenced source in your paper. The textbook is a good starting point to find topics if you are having a hard time deciding on a topic. Your topic can include the USA but you must also include a comparative perspective from the international community. Here are some example topics from your text but you are not limited to these topics.

Sustainable cities
Endangered species
Mineral mining in Rainforest
Uranium mining in Australia

Tijuana Sewage
GMO bans in Europe
Urban Sprawl in Brazil
Sea level rise and islands

Alternative energy in Sweden
Solar Power in Germany
Mining in the Congo
Sustainability

You may NOT write a paper on global warming, climate change, China's one-child policy, or evolution and creative design.

A scholarly peer-reviewed source includes a ***book, academic journal, or a government report.*** Websites may be used but they must be from reliable sources such as government agencies. It is strongly suggested that you only use internet sources found through the library resources.

The wild boar has caused extensive damage to the wildlife reserve (Smith, 1993).

- WIKI, Hubpages, blogs, anything not peer or professionally reviewed
- The textbook from this class or any other textbook from any class
- Encyclopedias (online or book), Dictionary.com, WEBmd
- Most websites with advertising are not to be trusted
- Home schooling resources (texts, online resources)
- Any text published by a religious organization

Term Paper Guidelines

Paper Outline:

An example of the detailed grading rubric is included at the end of these instructions but the following guidelines should be followed at minimum:

- Introduction:** Introduce the issue you are presenting. Assume I know very little or nothing about your chosen topic. Describe the topic to the best of your ability and delineate any subtopics or points of interest that will be presented in the paper. After reading the introduction, I should be clear *what* your topic is and have a clue where you are going with the topic.
- Body:** Discuss your topic using the various resources you found in your literature research. Present various perspectives, sources, and/or solutions to the issue. You may compare and contrast the various sources and perspectives. There should be a logical progression of you subtopics and integration of the source material. You should have many citations from the research you have done this section. You are finished when you are sure, I will know why this topic is important and you clearly learned something about the topic.
- Conclusion:** Summarize the topic again; highlighting what you learned, any questions you still have, and what aspect you need to do more research on for another paper. You could tell me what you think is the most significant point or fact and why. Basically, in your own words, tell me what the topic is again and why it is important in a few sentences or paragraphs.

Term Paper Guidelines

Use the College's Writing Lab as a resource. The tutors will not be experts on your topic but they are very helpful with forming your argument, double checking for grammar and meaning, and overcoming writer's block.

At minimum, have someone proofread your paper for spelling, grammar, and organizational problems. It is always helpful to have at least one literate and logical friend or relative read through your paper. Do not rely solely on spell check. Do not be embarrassed to let someone else read your paper. I routinely had my wife read my research papers for my doctorate courses. Even if she knew nothing about my topic, she easily and frequently pointed out unclear sentences, missing punctuation, or misused words. All researchers use informal and formal peer review before anything gets published.

Reread the instructions and apply these final notes again *before* you turn in the paper.
